Engaging the Lost	
Be on the lookout for opportunities to engage the lost. • "He entered Jericho and was passing through. And behold, there was a man named Zacchaeus. He was a chief tax collector and was rich. And he was seeking to see who Jesus was, but on account of the crowd he could not, because he was small in stature. So he ran on ahead and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see him, for he was about to pass that way. And when Jesus came to the place, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, hurry and come down, for I must stay at your house today."" (Luke 19:1–5, ESV)	
Engage the lost with the conviction that no one is beyond the scope of the gospel. • "And when Jesus came to the place, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, hurry and come down, for I must stay at your house today." So he hurried and came down and received him joyfully. And when they saw it, they all grumbled, "He has gone in to be the guest of a man who is a sinner."" (Luke 19:5–7, ESV)	

Life transformation can and will take place when we engage the lost.
 "And Zacchaeus stood and said to the Lord, "Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor. And if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I restore it fourfold." And Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, since he also is a son of Abraham." (Luke 19:8–9, ESV)
Jesus understood engaging the lost to be His mission.
 "For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost."" (Luke 19:10, ESV)
