4 🔲	The resurrection of Jesus Christ is a guarantee of the resurrection of His followers.
	• "But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. For an by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. But each in his own order: Christ the firstfruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ." (1 Corinthians 15:20–23, ESV)
