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Ezra encounters a crisis that threatens the integrity of the Jewish people. Ezra 9-10

- The crisis: Intermarriage with the peoples of the land 9:1-2
 - These various people groups from the land of Canaan had been under God's wrath since the time of the conquest.
 - These people would have come into these marriages "with their abominations". They brought their idolatrous religious practices with them.

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- The background: Old Testament Law prohibited marriage with the people of other nations and specifically with the people of Canaanite descent. (Leviticus 21:14; Exodus 34:11-16; Deuteronomy 7:1-11)
 - The main reason for this prohibition was to keep God's people from the idolatrous practices of these people. (see 1 Kings 11:4-8
 - A second reason for this prohibition was to preserve the identity of the chosen people of God.

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- Ezra's response 9:3-10:17
 - Outward expressions of intense sorrow 9:3-5
 - Tore his clothing (Leviticus 21:10)
 - Pulled out some of his hair (Leviticus 21:5)
 - Sat appalled
 - Fasted
 - Prayed

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- Ezra's response 9:3-10:17
 - Ezra's prayer 9:6-15
 - Like Daniel (Daniel 9), Ezra identifies with the sin of the people around him and acknowledges the guilt of that sin.
 - Ezra recounts the past sins of the people and the judgment God has brought because of their iniquities.
 - He acknowledges the current blessings and mercies of the return to the land and the rebuilding of the temple.

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- Ezra's response 9:3-10:17
 - Ezra's prayer 9:6-15
 - He is also well aware of the fact that they are not fully free, a lingering result of God's judgment.
 - Ezra goes on to confess the specific infraction of God's law regarding intermarriage with the people of that land.
 - He ends the prayer with the realization of the peril of this sin and appeals to God's justice and mercy.
