Bible Study Tip

"One Interpretation, Many Applications"

As we study the Bible, we need to remember that each passage has just one interpretation. The original author wrote to an original audience for a specific purpose. It cannot mean to us something different than it meant to them. Finding out about the author and the audience can help us as we seek to find the correct meaning of a passage. For each book, ask: Who wrote this? Who was it written to? What did it mean to the original audience?
